## CHILD CARE BY THE NUMBERS: BRITISH COLUMBIA

Child-care policies should be equitable for all families, regardless of the type of care they choose. Universal child-care systems fail to recognize the diverse care needs of BC parents and their reasons for the type of care they choose.

Of BC children under age six, about 42 percent are in parental care only.?

The majority of BC children under age six will receive no benefit from funds designated for centre-based spaces.

About 5 percent of $B C$ children under age six are in parental care because the parent could not find another option.'

Of all BC children under age six (those in nonparental child care and those who are not), about 32 percent are in centre-based care or preschool. ${ }^{2}$
