## CHILD CARE BY THE NUMBERS: NEWFOUNDLAND \& LABRADOR

Child-care policies should be equitable for all families, regardless of the type of care they choose. Universal child-care systems fail to recognize the diverse care needs of parents in Newfoundland and Labrador and their reasons for the type of care they choose.

Of NL children under age six, about 42 percent are in parental care only.

Of NL parents who use non-parental child care, about
67 percent report that they have no problem finding the care.'

The majority of NL children under age six will receive no benefit from funds designated for centre-based spaces. ${ }^{1}$

Of all NL children under age six (those in nonparental child care and those who are not), about 25 percent are in centre-based care or preschool. ${ }^{2}$
